

It's that time of year again. The holidays are upon us. Halloween. Thanksgiving. Christmas. Time to decorate our homes, write our shopping lists and make plans with family. We all have our own traditions built around this seasonal time of year, but in the church we have a few seasons of our own.

Halloween—or **All Hallow's Eve**—is the night before All Saints'
Day. While mostly a secular holiday,
Halloween's roots are a mixture of

Christian and pagan traditions. In medieval times, people believed that the veil between life and death was thinnest on this night, and so both good and evil spirits might be able to cross from the world of the dead into the world of the living. The practice of dressing up on Halloween was originally designed to fool the spirits so that they would do you no harm. Trick-or-treating has its origin in the practice of the poor knocking on doors to offer prayers for the dead in exchange for food.

All Saints' Day dates back to 609 when a day was set aside to pray for the souls of those who have died. In the church, we light candles and pray for our loved ones who have passed on. Although All Saints' Day is officially Nov. 1, we'll be remembering our own "saints" and loved ones from our church on the first Sunday of November—this year, it's Nov. 3. Even though we miss them dearly, we give thanks to the Lord that they now live in heaven and we rest secured in the hope that we will see them again one day.

The other church "holiday" at this time of year is

Reformation Sunday, which is remembered on the last Sunday of October. It commemorates the beginning event of the Protestant Reformation when Martin Luther nailed 95 theses on the door of his church as points of debate concerning reforms he wanted to see in

the Church. We didn't commemorate it in worship this year. Nevertheless, it is an important day in our church history and a witness to the faith of those who have gone before us.

Thanksgiving, of course, is not exactly a church holiday, but it's surely an important day that is dedicated to remembering and giving thanks for our blessings, especially the harvest. Although it didn't become an official national holiday until 1941, every school child learns its origins in American history when the pilgrims gave thanks to God for their survival in the new world back in the 1600's. The strong Christian faith of America's pilgrims caused them to recognize the provident hand of the Lord in everything which they experienced, and reminded them that their lives were in God's hands. This cultivated a sense of daily gratitude—something that is good to remember and practice ourselves. Perhaps you may want to join the challenge many have undertaken in recent years (begun on Facebook) to write down one specific thing for which you are grateful and offer a prayer of thanks to the Lord every day in November. By the end of the month, you'll have a long list of blessings to count.

Gratitude is a way of life that is tied to **stewardship**.

National Bible Week, now observed every Thanksgiving week, got its start on a turbulent day. Founders of the National Bible Association were reading Scripture over the NBC radio network on Sunday morning, December 7, 1941, when Pearl Harbor was attacked. Because of the traumatic events, the network asked that the Bible-reading continue all day, in between news updates. Radio stations throughout America picked up the programming, allowing countless listeners to receive words from God — "who comforts you" (Isaiah 51:12) — when they needed it most.

Thanks for heav'nly peace with thee.



Net proceeds from the event, totals \$1,337.44, as income for our 2019 budget.


The numerous hours of work by many, as well as the donations of all the food served, provided a very successful outcome. This is a true example of Time, Talent and Treasure Stewardship.
